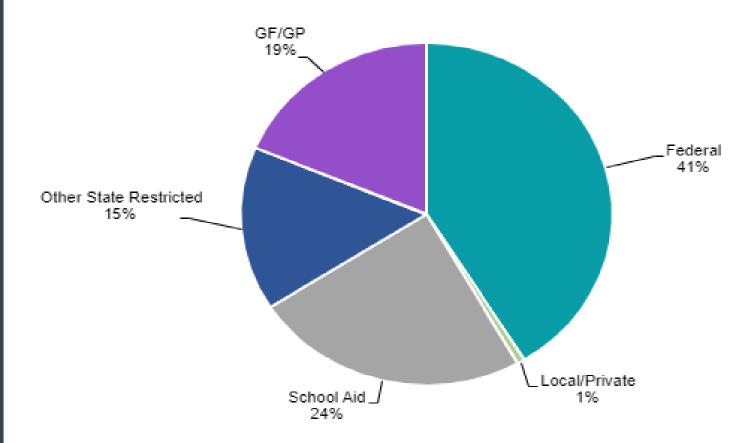

LOWERING MI COSTS

Roll Back the Retirement Tax

Saves half a million households \$1,000 a year

Boost Working Families Tax Credit

 Delivers nearly \$3,200 refunds to 700,000 families, benefiting almost 1 million kids

Deliver Pre-K for All

- To be implemented by the end of the Governor's second term
- Saves families an average of \$10,000 a year and ensures all
 110,000 4-year-olds in Michigan get a great start



Highest Per Student Funding Ever

 Invests \$718m that includes a base per-pupil amount plus additional funding for students with more costly educational needs

Per Pupil

• Increases base per pupil funding to districts up to \$9,608 (a 5% increase, \$458 per pupil), \$614m

Extra Supports

- Economically disadvantaged students, \$65m
- Special education students, \$80m
- Career and Technical Education (CTE), \$25m
- English language learners, \$1m
- Rural and isolated districts, Increases appropriation to \$9m



Path to Universal Pre-K

• Expansion of the Great State Readiness Program (GSRP) will get Michigan on course to have universal pre-k by the end of the Governor's term, \$244m

- Free books for kids, \$4m



Getting Kids Back on Track

- MI Kids Back on Track, \$300m over 2 years (FY23 Supplemental)

Literacy Supports

- Early literacy hubs, \$1m ongoing
- Family/community engagement, \$482,000 one-time, \$5m ongoing

Universities Operations

- \$64m ongoing increase, 4%
- University per-student funding floor, \$7m

Community Colleges Operations

• \$14m ongoing increase, 4%

- Infrastructure, Technology, Equipment, and Maintenance (ITEM) funding, \$200m (FY23 Supplemental)
- Post-secondary Scholarship Fund, \$50m ongoing, \$50m one-time

HIGHER EDUCATION

Michigan Reconnect

- Reconnect, \$140m (FY23 ARP Supplemental)
- Temporarily changes eligible age from 25 to 21, providing tuitionfree associates degrees or skills training to 350,000 more participants who were impacted by the pandemic
- Reconnect Bachelor's Degree Pathway, \$75m (FY23 ARP Supplemental)

Michigan Achievement Scholarship, \$350m

- Lower the cost of college up to \$8,250 over 3 years for community colleges, \$20,000 over 5 years for private colleges, or \$27,500 over 5 years at public universities
- Covers 4 out of every 5 college students in Michigan



WORKFORCE

Going Pro, \$55m ongoing (FY24 Executive Budget), \$35m (FY23 ARP Supplemental)

 Provides job training grants to businesses to support training for current and new employees in high-demand, skilled trades industries

College Success Fund, \$25m one-time

 Incentive payments to colleges intended to improve retention and completion rates

Expansion of Employer-Led Collaboratives, \$20m

 Support employer-led collaboratives to fill identified talent gaps and other workforce issues through training and education

Additional Workforce Supports

- Jobs for Michigan Graduates, \$1m, \$6m total ongoing for program
- Pure Michigan Talent Connect improvements, \$6m (ITIF in DTMB Budget in FY24)
- Retraining and Retooling Fund, \$35m (FY23 ARP Supplemental)

COMMUNITY

Constitutional Revenue Sharing, \$1b

- Payments made to cities, villages, and townships (CVTs)
- Represents a \$62m increase over FY23 enacted appropriation

Statutory Revenue Sharing payments, \$89m increase (17%)

- 10% increase (5% ongoing/5% one-time) in general statutory revenue sharing
- 7% increase (2% ongoing/5% one-time) specifically designated for local public safety initiatives for both counties and CVTs
 - Initiatives include public safety employee recruitment, retention, training, equipment, and infrastructure improvements

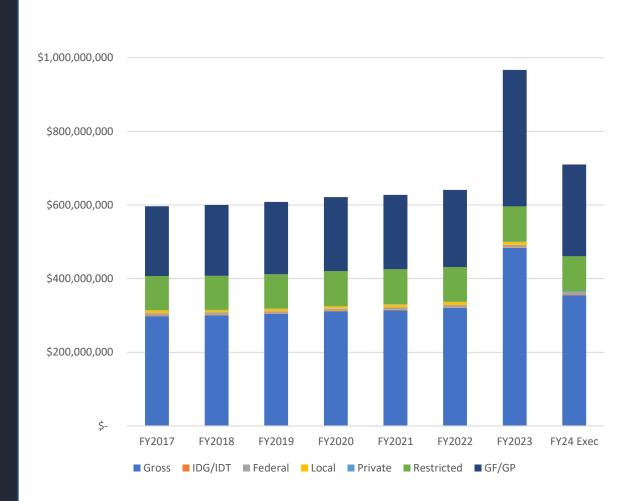
COMMUNITY

The state's judicial branch has been continuously working to position the court system and broader criminal justice system for the future

- Michigan Trial Court Funding Commission
 recommended the state provide all technology costs
 for trial courts, including case and document
 management systems
- Joint Task Force on Jail and Pretrial Incarceration issued a series of recommendations aimed at improving the efficiency and effectiveness of our criminal justice system and reducing our jail population
- The Task Force on Juvenile Justice Reform issued a series of recommendations to increase the safety and well-being of youth in the juvenile justice system, including reducing the use of detention, improving efficiency and efficacy of state and local oversight, etc.

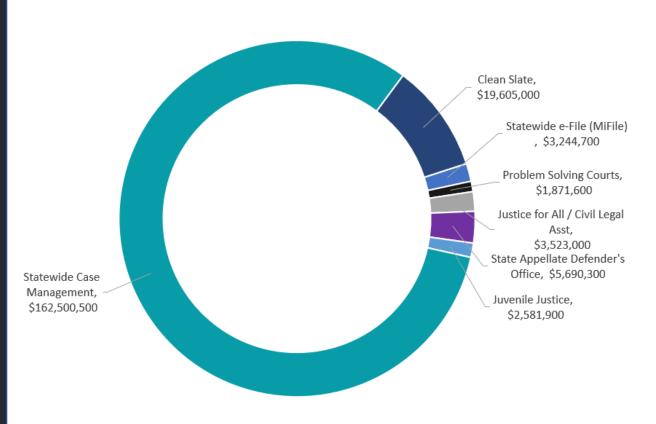


COMMUNITY

Governor Whitmer has worked to back up judicial branch recommendations by supporting legislation and appropriating funding, resulting in increased support for local government and trial courts in a number of areas, including:

- New funding to counties to increase the pay of appointed public defenders in appeals cases
- Continued implementation of Mi-File electronic filing system
- Increased support for Problem Solving Courts to address behavioral health and substance use
- Increased support to improve access to county legal Self-Help Centers
- Creation of a new division to improve the delivery of juvenile justice services
- Development of a statewide case management system for our trial courts

Health Access

- Nursing facility Medicaid rate reform transition, \$102m GF, \$110m gross over two years
- Direct care workers, \$75m GF/\$210m gross, ongoing, a \$1.50/hour increase
- Essential local public health services, \$30m ongoing
- Adult protective services, state hospitals, juvenile justice facilities, and
 Office of Recipient Rights resources, \$7m GF, \$10m gross

Insulin Access and Manufacturing, \$150m

Supports funding that will help decrease the cost of insulin

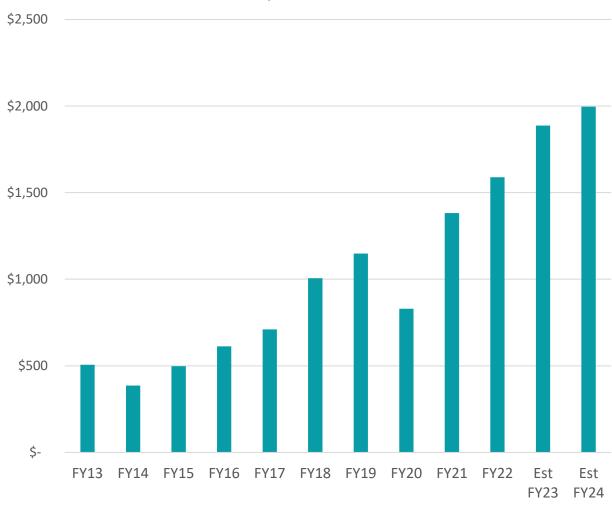

FISCAL RESPONSIBILITY

- \$1.1b Budget Stabilization Fund deposits
 - BSF \$200m (FY23 Supplemental); bringing our total to nearly \$2b
 - New School Aid Rainy Day Fund, \$900m
- MPSERS Reserve Fund Deposit
 - Deposits \$500m into the MPSERS Reserve
 Fund in anticipation of higher cost in
 subsequent years due to the negative market
 conditions during FY22
- MPSERS payroll growth assumption payment, \$202m
- Continued focus on one-time revenues and ongoing resource
